

World's Story 3 Supplemental Resources...

Suggestions for middle school and lower high school (and as family read-alouds):

- *Escape Across the Wide Sea* (France/Protestant vs Catholic/1686)
- *In Search of Honor* (French Revolution/late 18th century)
- *The Arrow over the Door* (American/1777/American Revolution)
- *A Christmas Carol* (Classic Dickens' Victorian Age England novel)
- *Nory Ryan's Song* (Ireland/during the great potato famine/mid-1800s)
- *The War that Saved my Life* (also recommended for Am. St. 3) (Britain/WW2)
- *Under the Egg* (deals with the stolen art of the Nazi regime)
- *Number the Stars* (WW 2 Danish family)
- *The Snow Goose* (WW 2/Battle of Dunkirk)
- *The Endless Steppe* (1941 Russia)
- *The Hiding Place* (the story of Corrie ten Boom/WW2)
- *Snow Treasure* (WW2/Norway)
- *God's Smuggler* (The Story of Brother Andrew's daring Bible-smuggling missions behind the Iron Curtain) Cold War period

Suggestions for High Schoolers (Please note: most of the historical fiction suggestions are centered around the twentieth century). I recommend using *World View in Conflict*, *In Search of Honor* (from above) and *Mere Christianity* as supplemental material during the study of the first nine chapters.

- *Worldviews in Conflict*, by Kevin Swanson (MB) For a further study of Worldviews (contains great information about the Age of Enlightenment). This is a great book to use as a resource or even do as an elective by adding the TG which has daily exercises.
- *Mere Christianity* (C.S. Lewis' monumental work about the Christian faith. In my opinion, a must-read for everyone alive.)

Historical Fiction for High Schoolers: (I've tried to put these in chronological order)

- *All Quiet on the Western Front* (post-WW1)
- *The Road from Home* (takes place between the World Wars, Armenian girl in Turkey, gripping)
- *Parallel Journeys* (an intriguing parallel look at the rise of Hitler from a Jewish perspective and from a member of Hitler's Youth - set in 1938)
- *When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit* (WW 2)
- *Cry the Beloved Country* (mid-20th century South Africa)
- *China's Long March: 6,000 Miles of Danger* (this story is covered in Chapter 24 of World's Story 3)
- *One Day in the Life Of Ivan Denisovich* (the story of a prisoner in a Siberian prison camp during Stalin's rule in Russia)

- *Murder on the Orient Express* (classic story of famous Belgian detective Hercule Poirot solves a murder mystery while a trip across Europe on the Orient Express)
- *After the War* (Jewish migration to the Israel)
